

I will miss the Christmas lights when they come down. When the night comes as early as it does in January, pretty lights on houses and trees offer a gift to the neighborhood – unspoken hope, a spark of intentional love piercing the cold night. We live out our baptism when we are a light to the nations.

I can't tell you what 2022 holds for us. The past two years have been dreary with the threat and uncertainty of Covid-19 as their defining structure. There is a light that shines through the gloom. The love of God made known in Jesus Christ is that light. We reflect that light through the dreariness as we keep on loving and hoping, and as we stay open to all that God will do through us. # Highlights of December's Parish Council

December is a busy month so I've decided to give just some highlights of the meeting. Minutes from the meeting are available for anyone wanting to read them in detail.

Gideon presented the proposed budget for 2022 and it was approved by council. The pledges for next year currently stand at \$71,280. The total expenses for 2022 are \$226,000 which is \$57,000 higher than 2021 budget, during which we had a part-time pastor for 6 months of the year. The budget will be presented and voted on at the Annual Meeting in January.

The closing on the parsonage took place on December 13<sup>th</sup>. A mortgage for \$130,000 was taken from Delaware National Bank and \$138,000 was withdrawn from the investments. Trustees have been discussing capital improvements that may be needed to be made on the property in the future. Trustees approved the purchase of a new dishwasher for the parsonage.

Council approved buying gift cards for the staff to show our appreciation for their hard work. Evelyn Jacksto's retirement will be recognized at a coffee hour in February.

Fran Ackerly has been hired as our new sexton and has begun work already.

Pastor Cathy reported that Nominations are all set for 2020. Kids Club has been meeting and they presented a pageant during church on December 19<sup>th</sup>. Cathy mentioned the possibility of a Bible study starting in the future. She continues to do some visiting including delivering cookies from the Woman's Open Circle. Numbers at worship have steadily been climbing during December.

Many hands worked together to distribute 74 boxes of food to seniors on December 11<sup>th</sup>. On the 20<sup>th</sup>, Edie coordinated the distribution of Christmas boxes for people coming into the food pantry. In addition two families were adopted by our church and as usual the generosity of our congregation was obvious by the number of gifts we were able to provide. Each family also received a basket of food for a Christmas dinner.

After the first of the year Trustees and Finance Committee will meet with Rose Niles, our representative from New Covenant Investments, to make sure we are invested wisely based on our long term goals.

Stay safe and healthy in 2022 as we face this new wave of Covid19.

#### The Word – January 2022 Food Pantry and Families

After a busy December I am looking forward to a quieter January. Our numbers seem to have started to go up and we continue to be blessed with many donations of food and money. I don't have the numbers for December yet but in November we served 33 families consisting of 40 adults, 6 seniors and 19 under 18.

Towards the end of January we will plan to deliver 13 boxes of food to the homeless being sheltered at the Buena Vista. The senior box deliveries will probably wait until Spring due to weather concerns.

Christmas seemed to follow Thanksgiving rather quickly this year. We no sooner gave out 24 boxes on November 22nd when it was time to plan for Christmas boxes. On December 11th we delivered 74 boxes to the Senior Community (we included Buena Vista in this delivery). Since it was the Holiday season we tried to make the boxes special by adding some Brook's chicken and a Thingamajig (homemade hand pie)

Carol knew of a family of 2 adults and 4 children that needed some help and Edie located a family through Public Health that consists of 2 adults, 2 teen-agers and a baby. Thanks to the generosity of the congregation they were provided with gifts and baskets of food.



The week of December 20th was a busy one. On Monday Edie accepted donations from 2 groups and with Lori's help handed out 10 Christmas boxes, Tuesday was a delivery from 607 CSA, Wednesday was shopping with Sandy for the Christmas families and Thursday was being available when the people came to pick up the food and gifts.

I hope everyone is starting the New Year on a happy and healthy note.

#### Introductory Comments

Our American society functions under a system of leaders and workers. The success of any business or organization is dependent on the performance of both. We have a tendency to honor our leaders and past leaders because they "lead" giving direction to a functioning group. Our coverage under this section of our Newsletter will have this same tendency while remembering the importance of the workers as well. This month we pay tribute to JoAn Fredericks who I find hard to define as a leader or a worker. My best judgment tells me that she was both. Her contributions to The United Ministry were many and reflects how the mission of our church has <u>and is</u> being accomplished.

#### JoAn Fredericks

JoAn Fredericks was born March 25, 1925 in Deluth, Minnesota. She earned her Master's degree in education from Northwestern University, she met and married Julius "Joe" Fredericks in 1959. They moved to Delhi where Joe was employed by the college.

JoAn supported the formation of The United Ministry and became a very active member. She served as a member and in leadership roles serving on Parish Council, Fellowship, Stewardship, Mission committees and as co-chairman of the Women's Open Circle. She made frequent visits to homebound and church friends. She arranged home visits for Pastor Mark Chatterton aiding him in becoming acquainted with our congregation.

JoAn was also very involved in the Delhi community. She worked with the Red Cross Bloodmobile, Village Improvement Society, League of Women Voters, and Delhi Senior Meals. JoAn served on the boards of Delaware Academy, O'Connor Hospital, and the West Kortright Center.
