## **Minister's Musings**

This newsletter is one way we mark time. Birthdays and anniversaries are another. The church marks time in seasons – Advent to Christmas to Epiphany and the ordinary time after Epiphany. Lent begins March 2, on Ash Wednesday. Then forty days until Easter, even though there's already Easter candy available in Walgreens.

The season of Lent is a tool to help us remember that time is precious. It is 40 days set aside from our usual routines and schedules for us to carefully and deliberately choose how we will spend our time. Of course, we needn't set it aside at all. But its existence is an invitation to step away from the routine and consider if we're content with our lives as they are, or whether we might live with deeper integrity, closer to God and closer to the ideals we tell ourselves we believe. For many Christians, letting go of a luxury, just for a few weeks, is a way to remind them of what is truly precious and what is extra and ultimately unnecessary to a life well-lived. I encourage you to embrace a Lenten discipline as we approach the celebration of Easter in late March. The cards available at church, or arriving in the mail are one tool you can use to walk through the season. You might simply incorporate prayer into your day, fifteen minutes of conversation with God about people and situations you care about. You might spend each Tuesday of Lent going through your closets, finding things that you don't need that might brighten the life of someone else. You might choose to write a postcard each day, or three a week, to friends or acquaintances you know are lonely or ill. You might commit to calling a different local non-profit each week to see how you might be of help to the people they serve. The possibilities are many. A holy Lent is time for you to refocus your life, so that the way you spend your hours is the way you want to spend your life. Such an endeavor is worth the effort. May you experience a holy Lent. May it be time well spent.

#### Announcements for March 2022

We will celebrate Ash Wednesday on March 3 in shared worship with First Presbyterian. The service is at 6:30 at First Presbyterian, Rev. Cathy Schuyler, preaching; there will be the opportunity for the imposition of ashes.

We elected new leadership for the United Ministry at our Annual Meeting in January. We will include an installation of church leaders in worship on Sunday, March 13.

The Parish Council will gather for a leadership retreat on Sunday, March 13, after church and coffee hour. We'll eat a simple lunch together and meet until about 3:30 at the latest.

The Parish Council decided at the February meeting that masks are always welcome in the church building, but will no longer be required. There will still be disposable masks available at the entrance, but you will not be asked to sign in.

A confirmation class will start soon for anyone in grades 6-12. Come to the Harder Room on Monday evening, March 14, at 6 for an introductory and planning meeting; we'll figure out then when and how often the class will meet. If you're interested, please let Pastor Cathy know.

#### Summary of Parish Council Meeting, February 21, 2022

After thorough discussion, the council decided to rescind the mask mandate for the church building, based on the general decline in Covid cases in Delaware County, and following the updated practices of the County itself.

Council will gather after church on Sunday, March 13, for a focused planning session for the year ahead. We'll share lunch, work for a few hours, and plan to head home by 3:30.

Play School is hosting a Can and Bottle collection on Sunday, March 6, after church, 1-4:30 pm.

Laura Clark reported that income and expenses were as expected, but the Treasurer's report with specifics was tabled until the March meeting. She requested that the Trustees transfer \$ 20,000 into the general fund at their March meeting.

The Finance Committee expects to meet in March. The signers for bank accounts were updated as per decisions at the January Council meeting.

Gideon Frisbee reported that Pastor Cathy will be out of town on March 1.

Jeff Ackerly reported that the Trustees met and elected officers for the year.

Jeff Ackerly, president; Jim Jacksto, vice-president; Peg Baldwin, treasurer; Ruth Vredenburgh, secretary. Now that the parsonage is finally fully ours, Jeff will assess the list of things that need to be addressed and figure out which we can do on our own and

which we'll need to hire out. No specific date yet for a spring workday, but we'll need one.

We'd like to gather again regularly for coffee hour, but we therefore need people to step up to host them. Cathy Johnson will leave a sign-up sheet for both coffee hour and for flowers by the mailboxes.

Pastor Cathy reported that there are packs of cards available for Lenten devotions. They will be available at the church, or they can be mailed to those who are interested. Kids Club is going well; there are seven kids coming regularly. She expects to start a confirmation class in the Spring. And there will be an installation of church leadership as part of worship on Sunday, March 13. Reports were submitted to both the Presbyterians and the United Methodists.

The council approved a building request from Curt Sather for a Bach's birthday concert on Sunday, March 20 in the afternoon.

# **Daylight Savings Begins**



This month we pay tribute to Evelyn Monroe. Upon joining The United Ministry in 1972, I recognized Evelyn as a very special person. Tom Briggs provides a short "Bio" that reflects my assessment. In my researching U.M. history I came across a report written by Evelyn that reflects on one of Evelyn's contributions to U.M. I have added her report found in the 1973 Annual Report. I include this also to reflect on some of the U.M. offering at that time. I am adding this as an addendum to Tom's "Bio".

Evelyn resided on Clinton Street and enjoyed a very large backyard. Evelyn was an expert gardener. She mastered the art of composting and tended to beautiful flower beds and a very productive vegetable garden. I wonder how many U.M. members received transplants from her backyard. If you did, please let me know.

## Evelyn Monroe: "You meet the nicest people"

It was decided last year that it would be beneficial for the congregation to celebrate the lives of some of the very special people who helped with the formation of the Delhi United Ministry. As part of this initiative, Don Haight asked me if I would write a piece to be published in 'The Word' about Evelyn Monroe, now deceased, and share some memories, now blurred, to rekindle some of the spiritual energy that she injected into the church community.

The first time I remember seeing Evelyn was in 1975. I was recently hired as service coordinator at the Office for the Aging and was visiting the new Delhi Senior Meal Site at the Second Presbyterian Church (present day United Ministry). Mrs. Monroe was walking

amongst the diners, coffee carafe in hand, a gentle smile on her face, unobtrusively welcoming members of this new crowd of senior citizens as they acclimated themselves to their new surroundings. She was a member of the "New Horizons" senior citizens club and was doing what came naturally to her; spreading kindness and connecting people.

Evelyn Rowell Monroe spent much of her childhood with loving parents and grandparents on the family farm in the town of Colchester. There she attended church, explored the surrounding fields and mountains, and developed through farm life her mindful regard for nature and its inhabitants.

When she was fifteen, Evelyn's parents moved to Delhi, and purchased a house on Clinton Street. She attended Delaware Academy and after graduation, continued her education at Syracuse University. She returned to Delhi and took a teaching position after graduation. In 1928 she married a local man, Jim Monroe, and became a housewife and mother of sons Philip and Lawrence.

Throughout her life, she valued relationships and constantly organized events that brought people together. She possessed an unusual acceptance, interest and understanding of different racial and cultural backgrounds and for many years housed foreign students who attended Delhi College. Until the end letters and greetings came from former students now living in Africa, Asia, and Europe.

Faith was a deeply ingrained part of her loving personality. A faithful servant, she held many offices in the Methodist Church and taught fourth grade Sunday School class for more than 30 years. When The United Ministry was formed, bringing together the Presbyterian and Methodist congregations, she was a leader with a vision to better serve the community.

She thought it a sin to drive to a church even alone and would always call friends who might need a ride. She took special interest in handicapped (developmentally

disabled) residents of a group home in Delhi, and saw that a church membership class was available to them. Today they are a regular part of the life of The United Ministry.

Her camera was a constant companion and she will be remembered for the numerous photos she took of people in the church and community, which she chronicled in her yearly albums, now a living history of Delhi.



Quite often when people would meet Mrs. Monroe on the street or at an event, she would greet them with, "Sometimes you meet the nicest people". I tend to think that this greeting was her gracious, backdoor attempt to encourage people to reach for their kindest selves. In a way it captured the essence of this special lady. May her life and her loving spirit serve as an inspiration for the congregants of The United Ministry and a legacy of kindness that will continue to manifest itself in the many good works of the church community.

I will continue to keep records on TODAY subscriptions and to forward the payments as a service to the Church plan, but I must ask that individuals get their money to me promptly when notified.


