

Minister's Musings

This edition of *The Word* is coming to you quite late in April, for a number of reasons, the latest of which is Covid-19. There are at least ten members of the church who have come down with Covid in the past week. Because of that, we cancelled church on Palm Sunday and will cancel both the Maundy Thursday and Good Friday evening services. We will gather to celebrate the resurrection on Easter Sunday morning, at 6:15 at the cemetery and again at 10:30 in the sanctuary. There will be joy.

I will miss the worship of Holy Week. It's a sad story we hear, of Jesus' betrayal and arrest, the trials, the crucifixion, the death and burial. It's filled with people who do things we are appalled at, and things we can identify with even if we wish that weren't true. There are bright spots – the palms waving, the feet washed, the meal shared, and love commanded. You might read all of these parts yourself in Luke, chapters 19 and 22-23, and in John, chapter 13, or add in 14-17 for more of Jesus' words that Thursday night. Or you might remember the story in other ways. The Lenten cards we started Lent with have particular observances for Thursday, Friday, and Saturday of Holy Week; the cards are on the church Facebook page daily. I often listen to Jesus Christ Superstar or Bach's St. John Passion in Holy Week. There are numerous movies about Jesus' life, many of which focus on this last week. There will still be a Walk of the Cross, on Friday at noon, starting outside our front doors. I'll still be in isolation, so I won't be there, but you are welcome if you're well.

Then we celebrate Easter (with masks) – and we keep celebrating it! We will sing Alleluia for weeks and weeks, and we will live as Easter people all year long – trusting in love, giving with grace, practicing resurrection and hope in all that we do. The resurrection is at the core of all that we do and all that we are. I look forward to living into new life with you, throughout the Easter season and beyond.

people, and anyone else who shows up, too. There's plenty of work to do, too – gardens and planting and painting and other stuff, too.

Highlights of March Parish Council

The March meeting of the Parish Council started with a recap of their retreat that was held earlier this month. Plans are in place for the Pot Luck dinner on Sunday the 27th. A committee is being developed for a community breakfast. It was suggested we might want to start our work day on April 30th with a breakfast. Congregation members would be invited to attend the breakfast and work day even if not able to work. Council had continued discussion on Play School including fund raising, registration and the need to be proactive not reactive.

Eloise presented the Play School report from Laura Mills. It was reported that the bottle drive raised over \$400 and that bottles will continue to be collected and can be dropped off at Dutch Redemption or at church. Plans are in the works for a fund raiser in the Spring and a presence at the Fair on the Square.

In the Finance report Laura Clark pointed out that we should be at 16% of income and we are at 13%. Expenses are at 14%. The March report will show the first draw of \$20,000 from the investments. Carol Greene reported that the Town of Delhi's assessor has declared the parsonage tax exempt going forward.

Jeff Ackerly reported for Trustees that they are working on a railing for the hallway between elevator and music room as well as reinstalling a piece of railing in the sanctuary at the altar. They also discussed the parsonage needs and decided what the Trustees would do and what would be handled by a contractor. Trustees discussed a handicap accessible ramp for entrance to the pulpit area. Jeff is taking measurements to see what would be

possible. Trustees work day is going to be April 30^{th,} which is community clean-up day. We look forward to volunteers from the college and can use members from the congregation to help supervise. There is a sink hole in the parking lot that will be repaired. A Technology worship sub-committee is being formed to continue discussion on improving the streaming of our worship service from the sanctuary.

Stephanie McCann reported that she has been meeting with Pastor Cathy and is becoming familiar with our finances. A meeting will be scheduled soon. The collection from the organ recital and reception will be shared between Curt and the church.

Gideon Frisbee reported for SPR that the committee is trying to set up some more structure for responsibilities of Personnel. Next meeting will be April 5th.

Pastor Cathy reported that Palm Sunday will include a reading of the passion narrative. Maundy Thursday service will be just our congregation but Good Friday will be a joint worship with First Pres. Pastor Cathy has been elected the chair of the Delhi Clergy Association. The walk of the cross will start at United Ministry and be officially hosted by St. John's. She threw out the idea of having a sunrise service. Pastor Cathy mentioned a few of the dates she will need to be off in the next few months. It was noted that Evelyn has been doing a beautiful job of chancel art.

Cathy Johnson (Nurture) reported that she is hoping for people to sign up for coffee hour. The coffee hour to celebrate Evelyn Jacksto has been postponed. Birthdays of the month may be celebrated at the first coffee hour of the month.

Eloise Henault (Outreach) reported earlier in the meeting on Play School. She had not received a Food Pantry report from Edie Campbell (absent from meeting) but many on council are aware that the pantry has been functioning well and boxes are still being distributed to the homeless at the Buena Vista.

Fred Onasch (Witness) reported that he had done some research on what UM witness role is how NOW should work together. He will work with Pastor Cathy to come up with a few goals for the year.

In new business the council received and approved use of building forms from Delta Kappa Gamma, Cub Scouts and Rebekah Efthimiou-Lamotte (harp recital).

Carol Greene reported that she signed the paperwork for the O'Connor Foundation \$3000 grant that we receive each year.

Carol reported that Karen Graves had approached the church about using her prints as a fund raiser for Ukraine. They sell for \$130.00, with \$100 going to Ukraine. After discussion it was decided that this was not something we were interested in and it was suggested that we take a special collection for Ukraine on April 10th during worship.



UNITED MINISTRY HISTORY

Activities and Participants

Introductory Comments

This month's article provides coverage for some of the years the United Ministry's steeple clock has served the Delhi community and crediting Bob Peet for bringing it back to life. I also will recognize Bob for other services he has provided U.M. and our community. Bob faithfully served as head usher for many years and has provided "coffee hour" for numerous times over the years. He was willing to sell U.M. a large portion of the backyard neighboring our property that allowed us to build our new building and expand our parking lot. In community service Bob - was a charter member of the Delhi Rotary Club, long time treasurer of the Delhi Fire Department, and an active member of the Masons. He also arranged for a horse drawn hearse for Delhi's sesquicentennial parade. Dedicated to a personal mission, Bob has donated blood and was recognized in 2017 for donating 200 times, reaching a total of 25 gallons. Many agree that Bob is a "stickler" for detail. A narrative on his serving as custodian of the U.M. steeple clock follows

Bob Peet's Care

An article in the Delhi weekly newspaper reported on the United Ministry church steeple clock's return to serving our community. It stated "After ten years of silence, the village of Delhi is once again hearing the ringing of the old church clock, as a local man has worked hard to bring life back to the United Ministry church steeple clock." That man was Robert Peet. Bob spent many hours studying the clock's design and movement, evaluating what repairs needed to be made. He succeeded in getting the clock moving and then turned his attention to get the clock chimes working and chiming on the quarter hour and on the hour. It required a lot of resynchronizing and readjusting cables and gears damaged through the years by weather and fire in the belfry in 1947. Bob replaced one of the clock faces (that was made of wood) allowing it to be illuminated once again now using a photo sensitive eye. Bob would see the clock from his property and



worked diligently to keep the clock providing the community with accurate time – reportedly within two seconds. Bob, rightfully, took pride in his accomplishment and continued servicing the clock for many years. Thank you Bob for this dedicated service.
