

# **Minister's Musings**

The back deck of the parsonage was power-washed last week, and it looks and feels so much better than it did. We had lunch on the deck on Friday in the sunshine and it was wonderful. But a cleaned-up deck isn't a new deck. It's not perfect; there are rough places on the rails and a stubborn stain on the edge, neither of which is a problem. The deck still works; it's a pleasant place to put a table and chairs and soak up sunshine, which is precisely what I need it to be. I mention this not to complain at all; things need not be perfect to work well. Most things we have are tools we use to accomplish stuff – to host parties or build relationships, to improve the world and welcome God's kingdom. A mentor of mine spoke of the specifics of our faith as tools with which we build and maintain our relationship with God. The explanations and metaphors we use to talk about God aren't perfect. We use them to seek to grasp the mystery that is God. Most of the time they work pretty well; sometimes they get chipped or dull in the process of discussion and living life. Sometimes they even get worn out or broken. That's OK. They aren't perfect; they're tools. What we're trying to accomplish – knowing God, living life with meaning, perfecting our love – are good things that are worth striving for. The tools we use, like the deck we eat lunch on, aren't perfect, but they're beautiful and useful and they help us live life well. Which is to say, I'm not convinced we have all the answers that allow us to understand all of the mystery that is God. We work with the tools of words and stories and conversation and prayer to search, to delve deep, and to live.

# **Highlights of April Parish Council**

The April Meeting opened with devotions and a check-up on how everyone was doing since we last were together. The topic of the month was Covid and how we would move forward since our outbreak in April. It was agreed that we would wear masks during worship, including the choir and avoid coffee hours until May 1<sup>st</sup>.

Eloise reported that the Playschool board was meeting this week and that they are planning a bake sale on Saturday, April 30<sup>th</sup>.

Minutes from the March meeting of Council were reviewed and accepted without correction.

Laura Clark presented the finance report as of March 31<sup>st</sup> and stated we should be at 25% for expenses and income. We currently are at 24% for income and 28% for income. Laura requested another draw from investments by the Trustees.

Stephanie McCann stated that Finance Committee would be meeting on the 25<sup>th</sup> and will review the budget and bookkeeper/treasurer duties. Carol Greene suggested we continue to pursue a meeting with the investment company.

Gideon Frisbee reported for SPR that they met on April 6<sup>th</sup> and will meet again on May 2<sup>nd</sup>. The committee is working on planning out their year better, including evaluations for staff.

Pastor Cathy reported that numbers were good during March with attendance highest on the 27<sup>th</sup>, when the Kids Club sang with many families staying for the pot luck luncheon. Council approved (via email on March 27<sup>th</sup>) to accept John Gaffney into membership by affirmation of faith. She reported that she had spent a lot of time prepping for 3 services during Holy Week, which had to be canceled. While she realizes she makes pastoral connections right in church building she feels that doesn't negate the need to get out into community/visit people in homes. She is making plans for a memorial service for Dottie Cook in July. Will be contacting the family and is asking for local connections who can help her during the planning stage. Cathy has been working with the Delhi Clergy Association for future activities. The Abundant Life Church will host a baccalaureate service for June 12<sup>th</sup>. The signs for the entrances to the villages will be installed this spring. It has been suggested to do a "Come Back to Church" Sunday on September 18<sup>th</sup> for all community churches, including hanging a banner across Main St.

Cathy asked if we want to participate in Fair on the Square at all in July? Further discussion and planning will be needed.

Pastor Cathy and the sub group met about technology in worship. Discussion included details about maintaining the screens for those in worship, plus the livestreaming for people at home. Both are valuable and need to continue. Chelsea and Marcus reviewed the sound system and will be making recommendations soon.

Kids Club is going well and the kids are having fun. They sing on April 25<sup>th</sup>. Cathy is working on making confirmation happen. She has suggested we consider having a free library in front of church. A box that would be a simple container where people could take and leave books.

Pastor Cathy is still hoping to go to Colorado for the Homiletics (the practice of preaching) conference the 16th-20th of May. No pulpit supply will be needed.

Cathy Johnson (Nurture) no report

Eloise Henault (Outreach) Playschool was reported earlier in meeting. Pastor Cathy offered that she had spoken with Edie about Food Pantry and they aren't getting some of their usual food from Delaware Opportunities. She suggested that maybe we could put the word out for specific items we needed. Laura and Gary offered to do a shopping at Aldis.

Carol Greene reported that we gave away 70 boxes at the April give-away. Many people participated including over a dozen college students from Delhi Tech.

Fred Onasch (Witness) no report

Building Use Form was approved to allow Delaware Opportunities to use the Harder room on April  $27^{h}$  9-12 for a Team Meeting.

Carol received an email from the Presbytery about church camp scholarships and will pass it along to interested parents. Discussion was held about camp scholarships and suggestion was made to put together a flyer to be put out to Kids Club etc.

Information has been released about the Harvest Festival in the fall and we will need to decide if we want to have a presence there. Discussion then circled back to Fair on the Square. Both Carol and Cathy mentioned wanting to have a presence in the community. Handing out cookies at the Harvest Festival last year went well and it was suggested that we consider something like that instead of a fundraiser at the Fair. It was suggested perhaps Fred and witness could lead this up.

#### Clock

When Bob Peet made the decision to stop being responsible for the church clock, I decided to take on that challenge. The year that took place escapes me.



I was given a short training. It was quite a job getting up in the bell tower to begin with. You had to go up in the balcony, climb a set of stairs and unlock a trap door. That area was just below the bell area. A short set of stairs brought you to the bell area.

A ladder then put you into the weights area Bob said that he was a part of this change from manually hanging the weights to wind up the clock and chime mechanism to electricity.

It was three set of weights with "tabs" to contact switches to raise the weights to wind up the clock and the two sets of chimers as the clock operated the weights would slowly lower down until the "tab" contacted the lower switch and the weights were moved back up. Funny thing that the "tabs" were constructed of folded copper or a wood shingle




and slipped between the weights at the appropriate level to contact the switches.

You next climbed another ladder to the "clock room". If I recall this clock mechanism was up in the clock tower around 1918. The clock did survive a fire at a later date. It is all open so that you can see everything move and do its thing . . . it's amazing to watch.



It really is three mechanisms. On the right side was the chimer, middle was the clock, and the left was the quarter hour chimer. The speed of the clock was an adjustable pendulum which was only about three feet long. The hourly and quarter hour chime operated with large, pegged wheels sandwiched together for the arms to pull cables for the strikers to hit the tubes down below. Making sure the chimes started on the right note proved to be the greatest challenge. It was not easy to "back" up either chimer systems.

Changing the clock from day light savings and back was always interesting. "Falling" back in the Fall was easiest. You just went up and stopped the clock by stopping the pendulum and went back up to start it up at the appropriate time. In the spring you had to manually allow the clock to move through each quarter hour and hourly chime for eleven hours and stop it at the near exact time. This process took about 10 minutes. Must have sounded funny to anyone that listened to the clock. I found it amazing as to how many villagers really do listen to the clock. If you were off with the time or chime, there was always someone that would make you aware of it.


# **Trustees Work Day**



# Introducing: Our Guest Preacher - May29th

**Dorothee Benz** is a writer, organizer, and strategist who has spent decades on the frontlines of social justice struggles in the United States.

Benz was the founding chair of Methodists in New Directions, where she nurtured a group of dozens, then hundreds, and eventually thousands of United Methodists in their determination to overcome the church's codified discrimination against LGBTQ+ people. She was the primary architect of what became the movement's dominant strategy of ecclesial disobedience, combining prophetic vision and organizing skills to bring the strategies of non-violent resistance into the UMC. Benz served as a delegate to the UMC's General Conference in 2016 and 2019. She left the church in 2019.

Professionally, Benz brought deep strategic and leadership expertise to senior positions at the <u>Center for Constitutional Rights</u> and <u>Lambda Legal</u> after decades of work in the labor movement. She has been an independent writer and communications consultant since 2020.

Recognition of her work includes dozens of labor journalism awards, multiple awards for website redesigns she led, and the Gwen and C. Dale White Award from the New York Methodist Federation for Social Action for her leadership of MIND. Benz is an effective and sought-after speaker, preacher, teacher, and facilitator; and has published dozens of articles and blogs in popular and scholarly outlets.

She holds a PhD in political science from the City University of New York, and BA in history and literature from Harvard University. Her scholarly expertise is in social movements.
