


The Surgeon General of the United States reported in The New York Times this week that at least half of American adults experience measurable loneliness at any given time. That's a lot of lonely people. Loneliness isn't just an

unpleasant feeling; it affects our health. Lonely people are more prone to depression, as we might expect, but they are also at risk for higher levels of heart disease and dementia. God said of the first human being, it is not good for this one to be alone (Genesis 2:18). That turns out to be a basic truth. We are created to be with one another. This is not simply a plea to come to church, though that's always a great idea, and an excellent antidote to loneliness. It's a reminder that you are not made to be alone, that the faith community is just that, a community, a place for you to belong and to connect, and that time spent together - over coffee or even over Zoom - is healthy, holy, and a worthwhile way to spend some of your day. It's also a reminder that there are a lot of people a) who love you and would enjoy hearing from you and connecting with you when you feel lonely, and b) who are lonely and would be encouraged to receive a phone call or a card or even just a text to know you were thinking of them. Loneliness hurts, physically, mentally, and emotionally. Reach out, friends, to your friends and neighbors, to your nephews and second cousins. And do come to church. We love being with you.

There's no particular agenda, just an opportunity to hear what's happening in the conference and in the wider church, to meet other people from the churches in the area, and to say hello. Pastor Cathy will be attending the gathering, and is happy to share the ride. Give her a call if you'd like to join her.

Highlights of April Parish Council

The April meeting of Parish Council opened with prayer and a sharing time.

The Topic of the Month was Stewardship and Pastor Cathy introduced a book called "A Generous Life" that is a month long study of stewardship and has recommended that both council and finance committee read the book as we begin our increased focus on stewardship in our church and prepare for our meeting with Rose Niles. The date of July 8th was set for the workshop with Rose Niles from the Presbytery Covenant Funds.

Playschool reported that they had a successful bake sale and were preparing for their bottle drive on the 23^{rd} of April. The banner announcing enrollment is across Main St and will up again in May. Currently they are expecting at least 10 for their fall enrollment. The board is considering adding Fridays for 4 year old and increasing tuition accordingly.

The Treasurer's report was presented by Fran Ackerly. Most of the figures are where they should be for being 25% through the year. Contributions are only at 17%. We discussed the line for pledged vs unpledged contributions. Also Finance Committee has been discussing if there is a better way to report to the congregation where their pledges stand each quarter. It was also decided to have someone count offerings with Edie so that other people are aware of how it's done.

Trustees have met twice since the last council meeting. On April 22nd we will be participating in the Delhi Community service day with a group of students from SUNY Delhi coming to help clean up the grounds at church and parsonage,

scrapping paint at the parsonage and doing some indoor projects if it rains. We may try to coordinate something with the same group to clean up our section of Route 10 before the end of the semester. A heat valve failed and led to a leak in the Play School ceiling but it was found and fixed quickly. The hot water booster for the kitchen and bathrooms upstairs was installed. Trustees are working with Jim DeWitt to get pricing for some other small jobs that need to be completed including the installation of handrails by the lecterns. Now that the building code enforcement has looked at the location of the proposed ramp the next step is to have plans/sketches drawn so we are able to get prices from contractors. Trustees need an additional trustee and the Nominations committee is working on this. Gideon continue to work on a few glitches in the sound system and will also be addressing the hearing aid devices that are no longer working.

At the Finance Committee meeting, the date was set for the stewardship workshop to be presented by Rose Niles. Also discussed was the desire to see if she would be able to come in the fall to talk with the congregation. The contract with Pastor Cathy to address the HAS payroll payback was signed and sent to Rev. Karen Monk.

SPR reviewed evaluation forms and policies for the church staff at their last meeting and are very close to finalizing it. Their goal is to have all evaluations completed by June.

Pastor Cathy reported attendance numbers averaged in the fifties in April. She will be away the weekend of April 22-23 and pulpit will be filled by a Presbyterian deacon from Walton. June 17th will be the memorial service for Joel Kazmerski and Leona Hunt's burial will be May 18th. The bishop will be coming to Woodstock on April 30th. Anyone who would like to join her to meet with him is welcome to come. The May council meeting needs to be changed to May 22nd. The NY Annual Conference is scheduled for June 9th-11th which Pastor Cathy will be attending. She also reported that she attended the NYS Council of Churches legislature day which was not well attended but a worthwhile thing to do. Kids Club is going well as is Bible study (they will be studying the Bible next). Pastor Cathy will be away the first week of July. As of May 1st, Cathy will be back on the Square during the Farmer's Market.

Edie reported that the Food Giveaway went well with help from SUNY Delhi students. Once again 73 boxes were distributed. Edie is looking for help on Wednesday mornings when her food deliveries arrive from Hamden.

Fred Onasch reported that he had mailed his postcards and had one positive return!

Currently there is a temporary spot open with Cathy Johnson not able to do Nurture right now.

A Building use request for the WIDE group to use tables and chairs on the square during Worldwide Family Festival on June 3rd was approved by council.

Our meeting was closed in prayer.


Food Pantry


Play School meets from September through May and keeps with the local school calendar for holidays. When Delaware Academy is closed for snow or other emergencies, Play School is also closed.

SPINNER

For Pentecost, make a thaumatrope, a spinning toy that creates an optical illusion of motion.

What you need:

- White paper
- Cup
- Scissors
- Pencil and markers
- Plastic drinking straw
- Glue

What you do:

- Using the cup's circular shape, trace two identical circles on the paper. Carefully cut them out.
- 2. In pencil, draw a person's head on one circle. Then place the blank circle on top and use the image beneath to guide you in drawing a flame above the head.
- 3. Color the two images with markers.
- 4. Apply glue to the backs of the circles and sandwich the top of the straw between them so it looks like a lollipop. Let dry.
- 5. Roll the straw quickly between your hands to view a mini motion picture.
