

Ministers Musings

As we talked about youth ministry at Parish Council last week, I listened to how many of us had significant experiences at youth group as teenagers, no matter where we were in church at the time. Many of us were in youth groups that included kids from 'outside' the regular church families of the day. And many of us are clear that our involvement today with church can be traced back to times of fun and fellowship and deep conversations about faith that happened in UMYF/MYF/Epworth League/Confirmation class/Pilgrim Fellowship/Youth Group, or whatever else your young people's gathering was called. If you're under 18, know that we're hoping to pull together a regular group for you to participate in here at United Ministry. If you're over 18, please think and pray about being part of a leadership team to work with youth. Popcorn, pizza, movies, mission trips, games, sharing stories, claiming leadership, and the power of the Holy Spirit – all of these are part of what a youth group here could look like. Let's make it happen.

I just got back from a conference on small church ministry. Here at UMD we worship with fewer than 100 people most Sundays, so we're considered a small church, as is every other Presbyterian and United Methodist church in the area. There are a lot of small churches in the U.S. today, and we're generally doing faithful work, loving neighbors, feeding the hungry, welcoming the stranger, baptizing new Christians, making disciples of Jesus Christ of ourselves and of That is to say, we are being church. Bigger churches feed more people and probably baptize more babies, but the love of Jesus is shared among us as well as among them, sincerely and often. The small-church conference opened with the reminder that all New Testament literature was written from and to small churches. There were many who were baptized on the day of Pentecost, but they then dispersed to start church communities in their own towns. There were other good insights shared at the conference. Church after the pandemic, large or small, is not going to ever be precisely what it was before. Some people have moved on, some have been disappointed. Others have joined the work of the church through technological improvements we have made because we had to. We regularly have five to eight households join us for worship via our livestream on Sunday mornings. We love seeing people in person in worship, and we know now that people participate in ministry in more ways than Sunday mornings. So we celebrate involvement in our work wherever and whenever it happens – online, filling boxes

with food for our neighbors, and in worship with sisters and brothers in Christ whether they're there weekly or only every once in a while. We'll be ok, whatever the future holds, if we let the Spirit lead and we follow in love. Amen and Amen.

Reformation Sunday with Friends

We'll share worship on October 29, Reformation Sunday, with nearby neighbors in Christ. Andes Presbyterian and United Methodist Churches, Cabin Hill Presbyterian Church, Bovina Presbyterian Church, and First Presbyterian here in Delhi will gather here for shared worship, with communion, for Sunday morning worship on the 29th. Pastors and lay people from all the churches will be involved in leading the worship, and there will be a joint choir anthem. We'll host a coffee hour after worship. It will be an excellent occasion; plan to be there.

Highlights of the September Parish Council Meeting

The September meeting of the Parish Council opened with devotions during which Chelsea shared a reading from Richard Rohr entitled *Creating a Community of Compassion*.

This month's Topic of the Month was Youth Ministry. We currently have 5 children in Kids Club. The United Ministry doesn't have anything to offer children once they age out of Kids Club. We have good relationships with Presbyterians and Methodists in the area, but Pastor Cathy gets the feeling that they don't have many children in that age range either. We discussed some sort of activity/event to let people in the broader community know about an open youth group? In order to make it happen we need someone to lead (Pastor Cathy + someone else?); some sort of structure (when to meet, possibly every other week on Sunday nights) and some sort of outreach to let the community know.

There wasn't a Play School report, as the board tried to meet and didn't have a quorum. They are having a meeting next week. Laura reported they have 8 students and that they were temporarily closed due to COVID.

Laura presented the Treasurer's Report. As of August 31^{st,} our income should be at 66% and we are at 52%, which includes \$80,000 taken from investments. Expenses are at 59% (should be at 66%). An additional \$2,000 was tacked on the August investment draw to go towards the parsonage improvements. Investments are moving in a positive direction although the amount reported in this month's report does not match the actual amount and will be corrected. The August report should reflect a \$1000 donation from the Presbyterian Church in Walton plus two additional donations of \$1000.

Trustees met last week and reported that the contractor finished, under budget, painting the old part of the church. He was also hired to pressure wash the rest of the building. Gideon has been looking into oil options and has a lock-in price with Kiff for \$3.70 a gallon. He will check with Allison Oil as well. Tank was filled in July before prices started going up. Trustees are working on purchasing an AC unit for the parsonage. They will talk with the O'Connor Foundation this fall to see what's available for funding to fix the stone steps in front and painting the bell tower. The parsonage porch still needs painting and the garden out front will need some attention. Barb Jones has been working on a grant that is based on the use of our building as a community resource. The information she has gathered should be helpful with the O'Connor Foundation as well. She has also procured a grant of \$2000 for the good Food pantry.

Stephanie McCann reported that the Finance Committee met at the beginning of September. Giving statements for the first half of the year were sent with a cover letter and will be sent mailed again after the 3rd quarter. Items discussed were fuel oil, painting of the church and which line item to use for food pantry orders from the Amazon. We received a bill from Mike Simmonds for damage when the TVs were installed. At the next meeting on October 3rd, Pastor Cathy will bring template of a narrative budget to help in getting started on the 2024 budget. Laura caught up budget for 10% of loose offering and unpledged contributions being given to benevolence which will be continued monthly going forward. Barb brought up the possibility of a suggested donation for the use of the building. Edie mentioned that she doesn't always see checks/donations coming in for the "use of church" fund. Carol will check with Deb about following up on donations/payment for building use.

Stewardship reported testimonials will begin on the 24th of September with Carol discussing building use and Pam Savage speaking about Playschool on October

1st. This is intended to lead up to mid-November Stewardship Sunday on the 19th. We will decide at the next Finance Committee meeting how to proceed with the rest of the fall testimonials.

Barb Jones was not present, but Pastor Cathy reported that SPR had employee evaluation meetings. 2 committee members are not well now. Next meeting will happen in October.

Pastor Cathy has been doing a lot of visiting with church members who have been ill/hospitalized. As head of a cooperative parish among Methodists she hosted that crew for dinner at the end of August. There will be a charge conference on October 14th at Walton from 9-12. Our charge conference will happen in January when we hold our Annual Meeting. The DS would like someone at the meeting for the first part. Pastor Cathy is looking for someone to attend with her since Carol will be doing the food giveaway and cannot attend, Cathy went to Presbytery last Saturday and is part of a Presbyterian cluster group that gathers periodically. They're doing good work and paying to send pastors to Small Church Conference. Pastor Cathy will go to Pittsburgh next week. They asked if we would be willing to be a "Zoom Watching" site for workshops on Saturday mornings. Deb will set that up. We will be hosting the 5th Sunday worship with the Presbyterians on October 29th. Deb Fleming will be preaching, and we will do a coffee hour afterwards. Plans for Thanksgiving are being discussed at Clergy Association. Currently we don't have any responsibilities. Meal will be organized by St. John's. She is not sure about when the service will be. Kids Club and Book Study has started.

Edie presented some updates on the Food Pantry. Demand remains high and some supplies are low. Potential that there will be 16 families fed out of the pantry this week. Pastor Cathy shared she had written about the Food Pantry in the Pastor's Pen section of the Walton Reporter.

Evelyn will work on coffee hour sign ups.

Our meeting was closed in prayer.


Blessing of the Animals

Volunteers Needed

We recently received a request from First Presbyterian Church of Delhi regarding the Kirk Thrift Shoppe. For those of you who have never stopped into the shop or contributed gently used items to them, it was created in 2016 to help their church financially through a difficult time and as a source of help for those members of the community that are in need. What started as a small effort has now grown and taken over many spaces in their church. They have expanded from not only financially helping to support their church, but have grown to now support other organizations, local people in need, victims of fire and abuse, mission aid in several foreign countries and other worthy causes in our community.

They now face the problem of not having enough people to handle the amount of work required to sort donations, price and man their Shoppe on the days it is open. Many people have been helping with this effort but as with many of our



churches, they face an aging congregation. They have decided to reach out to the five Presbyterian churches in the local consortium, which includes United Ministry. Their plan is to ask people from these congregations to volunteer their time at the Kirk Thrift Shoppe. These hours will be recorded, and each volunteer will earn money that will be sent to their home church. They are asking that each church use this money to support a mission of their church. They have not decided on an hourly amount (some of this depends on the profits of the Shoppe) but Renee indicated


