I skipped the fifth grade. Fourth grade was an experimental classroom of some sort and they let me do a lot of work on my own. When they realized that I'd read all the little pamphlets and answered the questions through the end of the series, they didn't know what else to do with me but to send me to sixth grade. My dad was concerned that I wouldn't learn American history, because I would miss the elementary American history unit that we got in fifth grade, so I was supposed to read a lot of history books over the summer before I started sixth grade. I read about the Civil War, the Revolutionary War, the Declaration of Independence, the pioneers moving westward, and the Roaring Twenties. It was a fun assignment. But there were only two black people I remember reading about in all those books I took out of the library that summer. Crispus Attucks was the first man killed in the Boston Massacre in 1770, and a black doctor came to Laura Ingalls Wilder's house when they all had what turned out to be malaria and gave them a dose of quinine. Further research, years later, tells me that man was Dr. George Tann. There have been many other blacks involved in the history of this country, but they weren't mentioned in the books I had available to me as a kid. I appreciate the opportunity to observe Black History Month in February to catch up on some of the stories and connections I missed over the years. I encourage you to brush up on your history this month as well. There are great books you might check out, like Isabel Wilkerson's *The Warmth of Other Suns*, about the Great Migration from the rural South to northern cities. Another great book, Master Slave Husband Wife by Ilyon Woo, was named one of the ten best books of 2023 by the NY Times. Or choose to watch a movie or two about history you don't know well - Harriet (2019), Amistad (1997), Selma (2014), Glory (1989), or Hidden Figures (2016). There are excellent kids' books out there, too - The Story of Ruby Bridges, by Robert Coles, and biographies of Thurgood Marshall or Ella Fitzgerald. I'm especially charmed by books built on spirituals like Let It Shine or Walk Together, Children, both by Ashley Bryan. Beautiful books!

In a similar vein, I hope you'll consider being part of the Lenten book study with the Cooperative Parish churches on *Anxious to Talk About It: Helping White People Talk Faithfully About Racism.* It will meet on Monday afternoons at 2 at the Andes United Methodist Church, starting on February 26. I'll be leading it; if you'd like to ride down to Andes with me to participate, give me a call.

May you be blessed with new information, or a new perspective, by engaging with Black History month this year.

Highlights of January Parish Council

January 15, 2024

Council began with Carol Greene sharing a devotion about the end of one year and welcoming the beginning of a new year.

The minutes of the December meeting were reviewed. A quorum was not present at that meeting, so all the motions made were not valid and were brought forward to this meeting for official approval. Some of these decisions included the approval of the Treasurer's report from November, approval of increasing the Pastor's professional reimbursement to cover additional costs over the 2023 budgeted amount, the approval for baptism of Madison and Olivia Vredenburg and the removal of a phone line and the local phone book listing for a savings of \$1000 a year.

Playschool reported that everything is going well and that they are expecting two additional students in January 2024.

Fran presented the Treasurer's report and the financial report for the year ending 12/31/23 was reviewed. A last draw from investments was not made as the year ended positive for cash flow. New Covenant Investment numbers were discussed as to where we stand going into 2024.

Stephanie presented the 2024 budget with edits from the Finance Committee. It included a lower budgeted income amount being used from investments and added a slight increase to faith giving. The miscellaneous income line was increased to reflect expected and known grant income. The phone expense line was lowered due to Trustees decision to remove a phone line and minimize advertising in the phone book. It was clarified that piano tuning and organ maintenance costs are currently in the same expense line. The Budget for 2024 was voted on and approved by the council.

Gideon reported that he had installed new CO and smoke detectors at the Parsonage and that more wood was delivered. He also fixed the front door handle and light bulbs at church.

Barb Jones reported via email that SPR had completed Documents 1 and 2, approved them and sent them to the DS on 1/12/24. Staff Appreciation Day will be on January 28th and SPR will host the coffee hour.

Pastor Cathy reported that December was a very busy month and that three services on Christmas Eve Sunday was a lot and exhausting for all. She visited Playschool during the week before Christmas. She also reported there was a Blue Christmas service on December 21st with St. Johns and First Baptist Church. Ruth K served cookies and punch afterwards. Our 12/31/23 service was not online but Deb was able to stream the service on 1/7/24 from home when roads were bad due to snow. Pastor Cathy reported about the baptism service on the January 18th which was fun.

Nominating Committee is working on having a slate of nominations for the Annual Meeting. Karen Monk will be meeting with leadership after the Annual Meeting. Pastor Cathy is currently either at the Legion or Diner for Pastor with Coffee. She can't decide the best place to do it but finds good conversation at both locations.

She submitted a Pastor's Pen to the Walton Reporter which was published online. Cathy also reported that the Cooperative Parish encourages churches to do things together that they can't do themselves. They are looking to do a book study about anti-racism and being an anti-racist church. This is currently scheduled for Monday afternoons at 2pm staring February 26th. The title of book is "Anxious to talk About".

Evelyn explained that Pastor Cathy had covered most everything about worship, but she could report that Coffee hours have been going well. There is a Potluck before the Annual Meeting on February 4th. Carol has talked with Charle about setting up for this with Stephanie's assistance. We will need to have some long tables repaired/replaced before this event.

There will be a Food Giveaway on February 3rd. Carol will not be able to be there on the 2nd and 3rd but will have the preparations and food gathering completed and a crew of people in place to do the Giveaway.

Fred stated that he wished he could have an active witness program in place but that he felt our Pastor is doing a wonderful job of this and he supports her fully!


The Book Study meets on Thursdays at 10:30 am in the Harder Room.

Lenten Devotional




Copies of *Climate & Faith: How We Can Help Meet the Greatest Challenge in Human History* are available on the table in the hallway.
