

Christ be with me, Christ within me; Christ behind me, Christ before me; Christ beside me, Christ to win me; Christ to comfort and restore me. Christ beneath me, Christ above me; Christ in quiet, Christ in danger; Christ in hearts of all who love me; Christ in mouth of friend and stranger.



These words are a translation, by C. F. Alexander, of part of a song known as St. Patrick's Breastplate. There are a number of translations around; the hymn/poem is attributed to St. Patrick, the bishop of Ireland in the fifth century. I am not Irish as far as I know, but I do love green. And I do love St. Patrick. This hymn of his is a beautiful and powerful declaration of his steadfast faith in God – Father,

Son, and Holy Spirit. Each section begins with a bold statement of faith, "I bind unto myself today" the power of God, the faith of the church, the beauty of the world around us, the story of Jesus, etc. And then there is this interlude, which I included above, recognizing and celebrating the presence of Jesus Christ in our daily life, every day, all around us. There is truth here, friends. Truth to get you through the tough days. We aren't at this alone; Jesus Christ is behind us and before us, within our hearts and in the hearts of all the people who love us. This is why I celebrate St. Patrick's Day with joy. Because at the end of a long, lonely winter, in the middle of the blustery, soggy Lenten month of March, we are reminded of the ancient wisdom of a hero of our faith. Sixteen centuries after Patrick's life and ministry, the words of his poetry still ring true. Jesus Christ is with us, wherever we go, in whomever we meet. So find a green shirt, grab a green hat for the day, sing a verse of When Irish Eyes Are Smiling, listen to the Pogues, and celebrate St. Patrick on March 17, basking in the good news that we are always in the presence and power of Jesus Christ. Amen.

Please keep each other in prayer. So many of our members are going through tough medical times – surgeries, Covid, RSV, etc. Hold your friends in prayer.

Highlights of February Parish Council

The February meeting of Parish Council opened with Pastor Cathy sharing a poem by a UCC pastor for Ash Wednesday/Valentine's Day. Cathy also made assignments for devotions for the rest of the year.

The Topic of the Month was a discussion of the Sacred Site Grant Program led by Barb Jones. We are eligible for this grant since we are part of the Town Square which is on the National Registrar of Historic Sites. Barb confirmed this with the NYS Historical Registry. The application was made in 1973. This grant is meant for capital improvements to the building and is geared toward exterior restoration projects with priority given to essential repairs. It is a matching grant that will require a lot of preparation work. They would fund up to half of a project cost and are averaging \$16,000 per award. It makes sense to pursue applying by the January 15, 2025 date in order to give us time to get the necessary paperwork done. Gideon and the Trustees will continue to do some work on gathering estimates and information about repair of the stone front steps, but a working committee will probably be necessary to put the grant together.

It was reported by Eloise Henault that the Play School's advertising banner will be going up this spring across Main St. They will be holding a bake sale at the St. Patrick's Day parade on March 23rd and would appreciate donations. Their next board meeting will be February 26^{th} .

Both the January Secretary's report and the Treasurer's reports were reviewed and approved by the council. In addition, there were some minor changes to the minutes from the Annual Meeting and they were approved as well.

Finance Committee chair Stephanie McCann reported that we have received an annual \$3000 grant from The O'Connor Foundation to be used for program expenses not salaries. Finance met on the 8th of February. It was decided that we would wait to take an investment draw until March. We will continue with Faith Giving on the last Sunday of each quarter. Finance approved Trustees to purchase a new computer for live-streaming using undesignated memorial funds. The finance committee discussed the Sacred Sites grant at length as well as re-working our church facilities form to try to capture more donations for expenses.

Gideon reported that Trustees approved the purchase of a new laptop for live streaming, using undesignated memorial funds. It also approved the purchase of some new decorative Easter banners with these same funds. There was a lot of discussion about the Sacred Sites grant and using it for the front stonework. The Trustees reviewed the building use form and began making edits and discussing many different options for suggested donations for certain rooms being used. Specifically, they are concentrating on McIntosh Hall and the Harder Room. It is likely they will develop different rates depending on how long the room is needed for, and what groups are using it. More details will follow. New Smoke detectors and CO detectors were installed at the parsonage and a kitchen cabinet drawer was replaced. Jim has been troubleshooting the faulty electric heat unit in the parsonage living room.

Barb Jones reported that SPR is meeting on February 20th and will welcome new members to their committee. She reported that staff recognition and coffee hour went well and was appreciated.

Pastor Cathy reported that she spent a lot of time last month working on the Annual report, narrative budget for 2024 and gathering the statistics for the Methodists and the Presbyterians. Kids Club has been continuing and Sandy Russell has been helping in the absence of Carol Greene. 16 people attended the Ash Wednesday Service. Thursday morning book study continues and is going well.

NOW reports included: Fred Onasch (Witness) reported that Coffee with Pastor is good for getting the word out as well as the Men's breakfast that Fred and Rick continue to attend. Pastor Cathy reminded us about our handing out of hot chocolate on the square during the St. Patrick's Day parade last year so it was decided we would try it again. Carol Greene will help organize it and we could use 3-4 people to help on March 23rd when we distribute it to the parade goers.

Evelyn (Worship) reported that we had 2 baptisms in January. She has started keeping records by taking pictures each Sunday of the altar and special events during worship. She intends to keep a binder with photos and service information for each Sunday.


Outreach - Edie was not at the meeting to report but she is continuing to keep the Food Pantry well supplied so they are prepared for their Monday and Thursday hours. The February food giveaway went very well, and 70 boxes of food were distributed. Someone who had received a box has attended church twice since the giveaway. The date for the next giveaway has not been determined yet but a strong possibility will be the end of April when we will be able to get assistance from the SUNY Delhi students during their workday.

Pastor Cathy brought forward to council building use requests that needed to have forms filled out but handling them this council meeting was important to allow the events to happen. On 2/22 and 3/21 the Delaware County Pride parent support group is asking to use our building. Also, on April 6th Pastor Cathy is asking for use of McIntosh Hall for her 60th birthday party. Both requests were approved with the understanding that the paperwork would be submitted to Deb and added to the calendar.

Our meeting was closed in prayer.

The food pantry continues to be busy. We are still helping 40-50 people a month feed their families. While a large portion of our food comes from the food bank in Hamden Laura and Gary also shop at Aldi's when needed and I tend to shop once or twice a week at Price Chopper for perishables, Donations continue to come in, go right one the shelf and are quite often gone the next time or 2 that we are open. Some of the items on the following list are an example of that.

- Jelly
- butter
- cooking oil
- canned carrots or beets
- mandarin oranges or pineapple

- rice or instant mashed potatoes
- canned tomatoes diced or crushed
- any fresh produce
- coffee

Although this is a mission of our church and we receive great support from UM there are many non-members who also volunteer and lend their support to make this mission possible.

God is able to provide you with every blessing in abundance, so that by always having enough of everything, you may share abundantly in every good work. (2 Corinthians 9:8)




Member in the News


Longtime member of The United Ministry, **John Bramley**, was recently featured in local newspapers as a recipient of 2 awards from the National Weather Service.

John Bramley, a dedicated Cooperative Weather Observer, has been awarded the prestigious 'John Campanius Holm' Award and the Length of Service 'Dick Hagemeyer Award' for his outstanding commitment to weather observations. John has served as a Cooperative Weather Observer since February 12, 1965, recording and reporting weather data. He took a break from observing as he moved out of the area and later returned as a COOP observer in 2016 and has been reporting ever since for a total of 45 years.

The Dick Hagemeyer Award is presented in honor of Dick Hagemeyer (1924-2001), whose career in NOAA spanned 51 years, the last 20 as Director, Pacific Region. Early in his career, he served as Cooperative Program Manager and was an ardent supporter of the Cooperative Observer Program. This award was presented to John Bramley for serving 45 or more years as a Cooperative Weather Observer.


