Ministers Musings



Rick and I drove to Charlotte, North Carolina at the end of April to be present at the General Conference of the United Methodist Church. General Conference occurs every four years (or eight when there's a pandemic) and it gathers United Methodists from all over the globe to make decisions about how the church will witness to the gospel and to the love of Christ for the next four years. Important decisions were made; love was proclaimed; justice was embraced; joy was

experienced. The most significant decisions made were identified as 3 "R"s.

- 1. *Removal.* Language was eliminated from the Book of Discipline and from the Social Principles of the UMC that said, "homosexuality is incompatible with Christian teaching." That untruth, and rules based on that untruth, have been taken out of our guiding rules and regulations. This decision is historic. It was wonderful to be part of the gathered fellowship celebrating the decision!
- 2. *Regionalization*. The General Conference voted to re-organize the United Methodist Church to enable churches in the United States to make decisions about some aspects of our work with regard to our own ministry and mission, which may be different from the ministry and mission of other churches in other places. The decision on regionalization is a change in the by-laws of the UMC and has to be ratified by a vote across Annual Conferences over the next quadrennium.
- 3. *Revised Social Principles.* The Board of Church and Society presented the General Conference with a fully updated revision of the Social Principles. They were slightly amended and then passed with enthusiasm. The Social Principles had not been significantly updated since 1976. The new document has a lot to say about creation care, about the ethics of global capitalism and commerce, about how we live together as families, neighbors, and the human family. It will be available in printed final form in January 2025.

Thanks for supporting me as an observer at General Conference. It was so good to be part of this new day and new hope for the United Methodist Church.

Highlights of May Parish Council

The May meeting of Parish Council opened with devotions by Carol Greene. She shared a reading that was drawn from Psalm 100:4 and talked about counting our blessings .

For the Topic of the Month we continued our discussion of Community Outreach and Witness. On June 23^{rd,} during worship we will be recognizing individuals who have helped with the food pantry or the food giveaway program. There will be a coffee hour after worship and individuals will receive a thank you gift.

Council decided to represent the church on July 5th and 19th, at the Fair on Square. We will probably give out cookies as we did last year. Anyone that would like to greet people and sit at the booth would be welcome.

There was discussion of recognizing the Play School in church possibly at the end of September or the beginning of October. Children and parents would be invited to worship and coffee hour. We will need to discuss this with Pam Savage before making plans.

Due to the addition of many after school activities at Delaware Academy concerns were expressed about the number of children that would be attending Kids Club the next school year. It was suggested that having something at our booth on the square about our Kids Club would be helpful. Pastor Cathy will update the church information on our pamphlet.

Eloise Henault reported that Play School board has not had a meeting but there will be a bottle drive on June 22nd at Bagels and Cream from 9-1. Ruth will be making ice cream with the kids this week.

The Treasurers Report as of May 5th was reviewed and discussed. Laura indicated that income should be at 33% for this time of year and was only at 26% and expenses were at 30%. Overall we are doing okay at the moment.

Gideon reported for Trustees that since the last meeting they had a successful clean-up day on April 27th at the church with the help of the SUNY Delhi students and church members. The upstairs handicap toilet was repaired and exterior signs were remounted. The old TV and copier were removed from church and taken to the dump. An AC unit was purchased and installed at the parsonage.

Trustees to do list includes garden maintenance – weeding and new mulch. Carol offered to reach out to local contractors to get estimates for renewing the gardens. Trustees will see about sealing the parking lot and painting lines as well as replacing the gate latch on playground fence. The front doors need to be painted. At the parsonage the back room of house needs to have the underneath area enclosed.

Trustees also authorized the opening of a Money Market Account through Federated Hermes with \$75,000 being transferred from the New Covenant Balanced Growth Account. Council amended and their motion from April 15th meeting to include the necessary information for the above account to be be opened. Trustees approved authorized traders for this account to be Gideon Frisbee, Ruth Vredenburgh, Margaret Baldwin and Jim Jacksto.

Discussion also took place about the Sacred Sites Grant and the need to get estimates for the rebuilding of the front steps hat are in line with village codes so that we can move forward with applying for this grant.

Stephanie reported that Finance Committee met and looked over the finance report which appears to be currently on target. Carol, Edie and Laura currently all have their own food pantry credit cards with which to purchase needed foods for the pantry and the food giveaway. A task force has been started to work on the O'Connor Grant and will meet next Wednesday with Deb Kearney, Fran Ackerly, Carol Greene and Barb Jones beginning the preliminary gathering of information. It was discussed that much of the information they will be gathering deals with the use of the building and will be useful when applying for other grants as well. Finance will meet on June 13th.

Barb Jones reported that SPR will meet on Tuesday and that they will be starting to distribute evaluation forms to staff.

Pastor Cathy and Rick attended the United Methodist General Conference in Charlotte, NC where many significant events and changes occurred. Cathy also reported that Kids Club is over for the year but they will sing on June 2nd in church. Two of the children are aging out of the group and there are concerns because we don't have a group to serve this age group. She also reported she had made a number of pastoral visits during the month. There will be a guest speaker from Massachusetts on June 9th as she will be at Annual Conference with Rick and Evelyn. It was determined that since Evelyn had been elected the lay member to attend the Annual Conference that her expenses will be paid for by the church.

NOW reports included: Fred Onasch (Witness) reported that Men's breakfast is going again and he does refer diners to visit with Pastor Cathy when she is there at the diner.

Evelyn (worship) reported that the Joy Banner is now up in the Conference Room and that while Pat was on vacation Ruth and Sandy led the choir. There was also concerned expressed that many of the hand mics are not working as well as Pastor Cathy's. There also was a problem with the sound during the streaming but Deb was able to fix the problem.

Our meeting was closed in prayer.




Did you know . . .

One of the organizations that uses our building in service to the community is the Al Anon Family Group. Every Wednesday at 12 noon in the Harder Room, Al Anon meets as a peer support group program of recovery for the families and friends of alcoholics

Al-Anon Family Groups, founded in 1951, is an international mutual aid organization for people who have been impacted by another person's alcoholism. There is no magic formula that enables one to help another person stop—or cut back—on their drinking. Alcoholism is a complex problem, with many related issues. Al Anon can help one learn how to cope with the challenges of someone else's drinking. Family and friends of alcoholics have the opportunity to learn from the experiences of others who have faced similar problems.

Evelyn Jacksto did a wonderful job of decorating the sanctuary for Pentecost!








