

Highlights of February Parish Council

Parish Council began with folks sharing some of their current joys and concerns and then Pastor Cathy leading us in prayer.

The topic of the month was the 50th Anniversary Celebration. Chelsea Frisbee has agreed to help with the financial campaign and the marketing of information once plans are in place. Both Ron Frisbee and Glen Reynolds have both volunteered to be on the committee as well. On Sunday the 23rd a meeting will be held during coffee hour to brainstorm ideas for what we want the celebrations to look like. Some of the thoughts that have been expressed at Council have included highlighting the Historical aspects of the church and the building and working with the Historical Association on a program that might include tours of the Court House square including the Luce Center (connecting with the new owner). In addition, Lisa Tessier's name was mentioned to host architectural tours. Also suggested was an organ concert using outside people. Key to all of this will be the publicity around whatever events we decide on. Also suggested was recording interviews with people telling their versions of the merger when it happened 50 years ago.

Eloise reported that there had been a Playschool Board meeting last week. She reported that they will be getting a new student after the break. They have a list of potentially 22 students for next year. Fundraisers include March 7th which will be movie night and a bake sale which will be held on March 22nd during the St. Patrick's Day parade.

The council approved the minutes from our January 20th council meeting and the minutes from the Annual meeting on January 19th. We agreed to approve the February treasurer's report at our next meeting.

Stephanie reported that the Finance committee met on February 4th. Since there were three payroll periods in January a draw on investments was needed to support the budget. Carol gathered a bunch of data on pledged giving, investment draws etc. over the last 10 years and Fran volunteered to put this into graphs for helpful viewing and planning. The finance committee worked on a short-term financial plan for 2025-2026 and approved it being sent to council for final approval. At council the plan was presented in written form and a motion for acceptance was made and approved by Council. This will be critical and helpful to the success of our next grant application to O'Connor. It was decided that the financial part of the 50th Anniversary celebration would be called the Campaign for the Future.

Trustees met on February 11th. Gideon will met with a representative from the Fire Alarm company to discuss updating the system and the costs. The bell tower clock has stopped, and the part needed to repair it will cost \$700. Trustees suggested taking it out of the money received from the bequest of Ann Smith. They are also working on replacing an old toilet in the parsonage and getting prices to replace the old carpet in the master bedroom. Sidewalk maintenance seems to be non-stop. Trustees initiated a \$15,000 draw from the Money Market Investments. Our investments had gained \$10,000 for the year as of early February which was encouraging. Trustees had their annual elections, Gideon Frisbee is chairman, Jeff Ackerly, Vice-Chair, Ruth Vredenburg, Secretary and Peg Baldwin is Treasurer.

Barb Jones reported that SPR met in January. They welcomed their newest member Katie Palm. A newsletter article will be done welcoming our new sexton, Kendra. Their next meeting will be held on March 20th. They will be working on Sexual Harassment Training for staff (required by state) and getting background checks completed.

Pastor Cathy shared that Kids Club was chaotic but going well and that book study continues, as well as Coffee with Pastor. Cathy has started a class at Drew University. There is the potential of 4 new members joining the church. Pastor Cathy made a motion accept Hope and Taso Pantilieris, and Delaney and Meredith McCann as new members to join United Ministry. It was approved by council. Statistical reports were completed for both denominations. She hosted a luncheon for the Presbytery Pastors on January 30th. The next fifth Sunday gathering of the local Presbyterians will be on June 29th in Walton. Pastor Cathy has been elected to be on the Nominations Committee for the Susquehanna Valley Presbytery. Cathy will be away the Sunday after Easter, April 27th.

Edie Campbell submitted a Mission report with some interesting statistics about our Food Pantry and Giveaway program. In 2024 we received \$18,861 in donations for the Food Pantry. \$9775 was spent to stock the pantry and \$9,906 was spent to support the community food giveaways. A total of \$19,681 was spent on food ministry in 2024. Another food giveaway is planned for March.

During our Witness discussion it was suggested that we once again give out hot chocolate during the St. Patrick's Day parade. Ruth V. and Carol agreed to help out

We continue to have new requests for building usage which the council welcomes and approved. One was for a Girl Scouts/ Daisy Group and the other was from a few local women (including Chelsea Frisbee) who would like to provide Resilience/Civics Training on Saturdays during March and April, to a private group of people in our community.






Stewardship Note: Faith Giving

ent is the most solemn and penitent of the seasons. It is a time for soul searching, study, disciplined sacrifice and fasting; a time to focus on the events, experiences and suffering of our Lord's final earthly week, so that we may be cleansed and ready to share with Christ in His death and resurrection.

Although this season is filled with sorrow and suffering and culminates in the crucifixion of our Lord, transcending all is the Lord's total forgiveness and complete absolution to the repentant heart.

John 1:29 "Behold the lamb of God, which taketh away the sin of the world."


Symbolism:

White circles (nimbus) represents holiness.

Figure kneeling represents

Jesus praying in the Garden of Gethsemane; symbolizes our need to search our souls, to watch and to pray.

Grapes and wheat represent Christ's blood shed and body broken on the cross for us; commemorates the Last Supper; symbolizes our need to fast and deny self during this season.



Sacrificial lamb represents the innocent Christ who died for us; symbolizes our need to sacrifice for others.

Shrouded Calvary cross with the three steps symbolize love, hope, and faith represent the crucifixion; symbolizes the supreme sacrifice – that of self.

Pitcher, basin, and towel represent Christ washing the feet of the disciples and His last commandment ". . . Love one another . . . "; symbolizes our need for humility and service.

Dove with olive branch represents forgiveness and Christ's words upon the cross, "Father, forgive them for they know not what they do"; symbolizes the Lord's total forgiveness and complete absolution of sin to the contrite heart.

Palms quilted into the border commemorates Palm Sunday when Jesus revealed Himself as the Messiah; symbolizes our recognition of Christ as our Lord and Savior.

Nails quilted into the border represents the crucifixion of Christ and His suffering upon the cross; symbolizes Christ's cruel sacrifice to assure our salvation.

Symbolic colors:

Purple = penitence Violet = sorrow

White = purity and holiness Black = sin and death

Green = growth; life giving Golden brown = earthly things

Ecru = linen color of the Last Supper

Blue = royalty and service of Christ on earth

This snack's layers mimic properties of our planet's crust.


What you need:

- 1 cup rolled oats
- ½ cup nut butter (divided)
- ½ cup chocolate chips
- Microwave-safe bowl
- Silicone mini baking cups

What you do:

- Combine the oats and ½ cup of the nut butter. Mix until oats stick together.
- Place 2 teaspoons of oat mixture in each baking cup. Press with a spoon. Freeze for 10 minutes.
- Spread remaining nut butter atop the cups. Freeze for 10 more minutes.
- Microwave the chocolate chips
 30 seconds. Stir and keep heating
 for 30-second intervals until melted.
- 5. Spread melted chocolate atop the cups. Freeze until chocolate is firm.
- Remove from the molds and enjoy! Refrigerate leftovers in an airtight container.
