Ministers Musings

Finally, brothers and sisters, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things. Philippians 4:8

They say that if March comes in like a lion, it will go out like a lamb, or viceversa. A prediction about the unpredictability of weather, or a way to say that the transition from winter to spring is seldom directly linear. Two days of beautiful days in the 60s followed by a week of snow and cold rain. Crocuses peeking out into sunshine and then enough wind to send branches careening across the yard. Lent is a little like that as well. It's offered to us as a solemn and penitential time, an opportunity to sharpen our prayer discipline and to practice self-examination and confession. Then the lectionary gives us some of scripture's most wonderful and loving texts, as unpenitential as possible. Isaiah proclaims, 'Come, buy wine and milk without money and without price!' God's love invites all to come and enjoy! Jesus tells the story of a man with two sons, both of whom he loves deeply and unconditionally. Joy and love and grace abound week after week, until we come to Jesus' arrival in Jerusalem. Then there's a quick reversal and we hear about confusion and anger and betrayal and torture and pain and death. All of it grounded in the foundational truth of the Easter joy that's on the way.

Spring and Lent both, together and separately, are roller coasters of emotion. Most of us are already dealing with other stressors – family challenges, health challenges, financial uncertainty – and this may well begin to feel utterly overwhelming. Take an off-ramp from the amusement ride. Take a walk, wind or no wind, call a friend and laugh with them about their grandchildren, think about the good things Paul recommends to the Philippians – whatever is true and honorable and just, sing yourself a song, come to church. You don't have to engage with the uproar around you all the time. Yes, God's love invites you to wrestle with troubles you encounter, but not incessantly. God also offers you green pastures and still waters, rest for your weary soul and balm for your pain. Take God up on the invitation to rest a while.

I hope you'll share the story of Holy Week with us in worship. Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and the celebrations of Easter are powerful experiences, always. There's a place for you, and we'd love to see you.

Highlights of March Parish Counci, March 17, 2025

Stephanie opened the meeting with a reflection of appreciation for the way the church has cared for her family, from her mom's funeral a year ago to welcoming Meredith and Delaney as members two weeks ago.

We began our business with an update and a discussion of plans for UMD's 50th Anniversary Celebration. Our hope is that we celebrate all year long in 2026, beginning the fundraising campaign early in the year and culminating with a big event in the fall, perhaps on a long weekend. We hope to host another brainstorming meeting during coffee hour on April 6 (moved to April 27 because of scheduling conflicts). Ideas for the year also include a special music concert, some kind of presence at Fair on the Square, and shared events with other organizations in town. The committee is not set in stone, but there are at least four or five people who have indicated interest in serving.

The February minutes and the March treasurer's report were presented and approved.

The Finance Committee came to the Council with a recommendation that the budget be adjusted for the second half of the year to reflect an annual pastoral compensation package of \$40,000 to \$45,000, expecting a half-time pastor who would live in the parsonage. This would be a \$50,000 savings to our annual budget (\$25,000 for the rest of 2025). We talked about precisely what half-time ministry would look like. The process of deciding that would go to SPR, but we hope to include a conversation and a survey of the congregation as we decide priorities of pastoral care. Gideon and Carol, as lay leaders, have had conversations with both Greg Garis, the Executive Presbyter, and with Karen Monk, the United Methodist District Superintendent, both of whom are supportive of a UMD decision to change the by-laws and broaden our possibilities for pastoral leadership.

Collections for Faith Giving have often been on inconvenient Sundays since we set them as the last Sunday of the quarter. We decided to move Faith Giving Sundays to the first Sunday of the last month of each quarter, beginning with June 1, 2025. First quarter giving statements will go out in early April.

Trustees. Gideon reported that Robert Dee can fix the steeple clock with a \$200 part and the Trustees approved that expense. He also will come up with an estimate and an explanation to simplify the working parts of the clock.

Johnson Control says we need to replace our fire control panel because it is obsolete. Trustees have approved the replacement; we expect to apply for an O'Connor grant to help with the cost.

The Trustees are considering purchasing new, nicer chairs for McIntosh Hall. Carol will look at color choices and compare prices.

The bedroom carpet in the parsonage will be replaced once Cathy and Rick move out instead of this spring, so we don't have to move furniture to do the job. A new toilet will be installed in the MB bathroom soon.

The new 15-minute parking sign just went up. We'd like to ask the Village for a clarifying addition to the sign that says it's only valid M-F, 9-3.

SPR will meet on March 18.

Pastor Cathy. Communion on March 2; 38 people were served.

Meredith and Delaney joined the church on March 2. Hope and Taso Pantilieris will join on March 23, and Hope and the two kids will be baptized that day also. Cathy will be appointed to churches on Long Island as of July 1. Her last Sunday will be June 22, with the expectation that we will worship with the Presbyterian churches in the area at Walton for a special music Sunday on June 29. Ash Wednesday service occurred on March 5; there are Lenten devotional materials available. Thursday morning book study is looking at the new United Methodist Social Principles for the next few weeks. Kids' Club is good. Pastor Cathy will be away on Sunday, April 27. Chelsea Frisbee Johnson will preach that Sunday. There is a Presbytery Assembly on April 12; Pastor Cathy will attend.

Outreach. Play School. Eloise reported that there are now four students for the Spring. There are 22 names of interested students for next fall. There was a movie night fundraiser on March 7, with a decent turnout. There's a bake sale fundraiser at the St. Patrick's Day parade. Funds are tight.

Witness. We will offer hot chocolate at the St. Paddy's Day Parade. We will meet at the church at 11:15 to be ready for the parade at noon. Carol and Ruth V. and Pastor Cathy will serve the hot chocolate.

Other business. John Gaffney asked to be removed from UMD membership. The Council voted to remove his name from the rolls.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be on Tuesday, April 15.

Food Ministry

March has always seemed like a long, unpredictable month. It was unpredictable weather-wise but it seemed to fly by this year. The pantry was busy with 38 families coming in. That means counting family members we provided food for 76 people.

We did get to a Shop the Lot for pantries. it was cold that day with a hint of sun but by the time we got to Oneonta it was snowing pretty hard. We did pick up a case of heads of cauliflower, some tomatoes on the vine, carrots and nectarines all of which were a treat to our people as they are things we don't normally carry. We plan to check out the other ones when they have them.

We did receive a donations from the farmers of 10# of pork chops, 10 # of pork roasts and 5# of beef shanks which was appreciated as well as the donation of a fairly large number of Ensure and a bag of assorted toiletries that a church had been collecting for CWS. It seems like whatever comes in we find a home for.

I was also able to meet with a woman who was in Andes visiting her daughters. She is a large donor and it was good to meet her and show her around.

There was a pantry advisory board meeting this past Wednesday. Among other things we were given copies of the food distributions that will be held this year. You need to pre-register for these. Deb will see that they get posted. We also received info that Chobani will be at the Southside mall on the 2nd and 4th Thursdays of the month to give away yogurt. This is open to the public and is being held from 11:00 till noon. I have no idea what products or how much they might be giving away. If you are in Oneonta and decide to check it out please pass the info along.

And last but not least we held another giveaway this past Saturday. Unfortunately Carol was unable to participate this time but due to all her planning and purchasing things ahead of time as well as having well trained her crew we were able to make it happen.

72 boxes were packed and delivered to the Senior Community, temporary housing, and some community members. We had help from the Girl Scouts and the college so all went quickly.



13 boxes were also delivered during the month of March to persons temporarily housed.

Please be sure to save any egg cartons you may have and bring them to the pantry. Sometimes the only way we can afford to give out eggs is by buying them in bulk, meaning they come in flats and have to be put into cartons. Also items we could use are crackers, coffee, tea, Chunky soup or Progresso, tomato soup and pasta (NOT elbows or spaghetti).

My mom used to have a plaque that read "Thank God for dirty dishes they have a tale to tell, while others may go hungry we're eating rather well; with home, health and happiness we shouldn't want to fuss, God's been very good to us."
